- County-month dataset of Freedmen's Bureau schools and educational attainments of formerly enslaved people across the Reconstruction South from 1865-1870
- Includes microdata coded from 5000+ archival teachers' reports on attendance and instruction, disaggregated by subject and gender at the school-month level
